Subject R.E. **Theme** What do Christians believe Jesus did to 'save' people? **Term** 4

What should I already know?

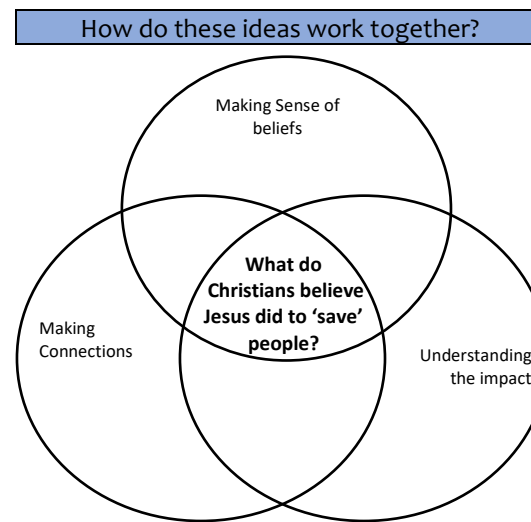
- Christians believe that the Bible tells of how people can get back to God's love.
- The Gospel texts contain stories about Jesus and his teachings.
- The New Testament contains advice for Christians about how to live.

Key Vocabulary	
Gospels	The first 4 books in the New Testament written by Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. They talk about Jesus' life and teachings.
Holy Week	The events described in the Bible in the week before Jesus' death.
Holy Communion	A Christian worship service, where bread and wine are declared sacred and shared with the congregation.
Sacrifice	The act of giving up something highly valued for the sake of others. Christians believe God sacrificed his son, Jesus, to save mankind.
Incarnation	The Christian belief that God took human form by becoming Jesus. Incarnation literally means 'to take on flesh'.
Salvation	The act of saving someone from evil.
Resurrection	To bring something back from the dead. Christians believe Jesus rose from the dead.
Restoration	Christians believe mankind needs to constantly work on their relationship with God.
Martyr	Someone that suffers persecution or death for their beliefs.

What will I learn about?

I will learn about:

- The story of Adam and Eve and 'The Fall' and how this leads to the Christian concept of 'Original Sin'.
- Christians read the 'big story' of the Bible as pointing out the need for God to save people.
- The events of Holy Week. The Gospels give an account of Jesus' death and resurrection.
- The mainstream Christian belief is Jesus' death was a sacrifice - a price he paid to save people from their sins and bring them back to God.
- Christians remember Jesus's sacrifice through the service of Holy Communion (also called the Lord's Supper, the Eucharist and Mass).
- Christians believe that Jesus calls them to sacrifice their own needs to the needs of others.
- A martyr is someone suffers persecution or death for their beliefs. Ten twentieth-century martyrs are commemorated at Westminster Abbey.
- Malala Yousufzai as a current day example of a person who stands up for what she believes in.
- There are different points of view on the role of sacrifice in the world today.



What should I know by the end of the unit?

Make sense of beliefs:

- Outline the 'big story' of the Bible, explaining how Incarnation and Salvation fit within it.
- Explain what Christians mean when they say Jesus' death was a sacrifice.

Understand the impact:

- Make connections between the Christian belief in Jesus' death as a sacrifice and how they celebrate Holy Communion/Lord's Supper.
- Show how Christians put their beliefs in to practice in different ways.

Make connections

- Weigh up the value and impact of ideas of sacrifice in their own lives and the world today.
- Articulate their own responses to the idea of sacrifice, recognising different points of view.
